

COURSE DESIGNATIONS SURVEY

1) what your college's current designations are (e.g., "ENG 101" for Comp. 1) and 2) whether or not your college will be revising these designations (e.g., changing "ENG 101" to "ENGL 1001") for the semester conversion, even if your college is already on a semester system?

Belmont Technical College	Belmont Technical College is in the decision-making process regarding our new course numbering/coding system. We are leaning toward a simple system that preserves the course numbering and coding history, yet clearly delineates the quarter from the semester numbers/codes in our administrative data base system. We may decide to add a "0" and an "S" to certain current course numbers/codes to formulate the new system. Currently we have a three-letter plus a three-number code assigned to each course. Not sure yet what the final decision will be for the semester system.
Central Ohio Technical College	We are looking at a range of 2-7 alphas and 3 numbers.
Cincinnati State Technical & Community College	Current: 3 alpha, 4 numeric: Example PSY 1501 Planned w/ Semester Conversion: 3 alpha, 3 numeric: Example PSY 101
Clark State Community College	We are increasing the numeric from 3 to 4 places and keeping the alpha the same. ENG-110 to ENG-1100
Columbus State Community College	For the semester conversion Columbus State is using the same alpha and going from a 3 to 4 digit numeric. For the numeric portion starting with "0" is Dev. Ed. for "1" is freshman and for "2" is sophomore.
Cuyahoga Community College	Cuyahoga Community College uses a three or four letter plus four-digit system for most courses (e.g., ENG 1010 for College Composition I; HIST 2090 for Ohio History) and a three-digit-plus-letter system for certain categories of courses (e.g., ESCI 141L for Laboratory in Physical Geology; CHEM 130H for Honors General Chemistry I). We have no plans to revise these designations.
Eastern Gateway Community College	EGCC converted its course numbers from two alpha three numeric to three alpha, three numeric when we converted from quarters to semester in 1995.
Edison Community College	When Edison changed to semesters in 1994 we wanted to keep some of the same course numbers so all of our semester classes are three letters, three numbers and followed with an "S". to denote the semester version. For example, the quarter ENG 121 became the semester course, ENG 121S.
Hocking College	
Lakeland Community College	When Lakeland converted to the semester system in 2000, we changed our alpha-numeric course designation to four alpha and four numerals, e.g., ENGL 1110, MATH 1650, etc. Under the quarter system, we used 3-5 alpha and three numerals.

Lorain County Community College	LCCC does not have plans to revise its course numbers for the following courses: ENGL 161- College Composition I ENGL 162 - College Composition II LCCC has been on a semester schedule for the last several years (since 1998) and is not considering renumbering its course system at this time. 4 alphas/3 numerics except we may have a "G" after the numerics if the course is globalized
Marion Technical College	
North Central State College	We are going from a three letter/three number system to a four letter/four number system.
Northwest State Community College	We use three letters and three numbers - For example, ENG111 Composition I. We are already on semesters and are not planning to change.
Owens Community College	We use a three number designation - ENG 111. We are not planning on revising this system since we are already on the semester system.
Rhodes State College	At Rhodes we are going from 3 Alpha and 3 numerals to 3 alpha and 4 numerals.
Rio Grande Community College	We use ENG 11103 for Comp I and ENG 11203 for Comp II, etc.. The last two digits are the credit hours. We leave two digits for credit hours because we have an 11 credit-hour nursing course and clinical practice (i.e. student teaching) in the School of Education is 15 credit hours. We used an entirely different scheme for numbering courses on semesters than we had on quarters. This makes it very easy to look at a transcript and identify whether the courses are semester or quarter courses.
Sinclair Community College	
Southern State Community College	We currently have a 4 letter 3 number (ENGL101) course numbering process. I believe we will be utilizing a 4 letter 4 number (ENGL1101) process under semesters. We will simply add a "1" to all 100 level courses and a "2" to all 200 level courses.
Stark State College of Technology	At Stark State, we have been on semester since 1993. Our designation is 3 alpha's and 3 numeric's i.e. ENG101.
Terra Community College	At Terra, we designate our courses with 3 alpha's and 4 numeric's. (i.e. ENG 1020).
Washington State Community College	Course numbering under the semester system will use the same four-letter subject code as the quarter system (ENGL, MATH, HLTH, etc.) and a 4-digit numeric code for each specific course. In some cases, the current course number will be simply followed by a "0" in order to relate the new system to the old wherever possible. For example, Speech is numbered SPCH 151 under the quarter system and will be numbered SPCH 1510 under the semester system. In other cases, a new course number will be chosen for the course, particularly when a three-quarter sequence becomes a two-semester sequence. The lab sections of courses will be listed with their own course and section number. Lab courses will end in "L." For example: BIOL 101L 01
Zane State College	We at Zane are moving from 3-3 to 4-4
